
Wages

Hours

What is a Transnational Corporation (TNC)?

A transnational corporation is a company that operated worldwide like Amazon, Steam and Sony. They are big companies that most people know and have many headquarters in lots of countries. They are also the main cause of bad work environments as we (the consumers want cheap products) but they cannot do this without lowering their wages or cutting back on health and safety measures. They choose the health and safety as then they are not affected.

I think a alternative is for us the consumers to say we want far treatment and be ready for a price increase as this is the only way to get this. This means no more £1 batteries or £100 TVs or 20p watches. And also if we reuse goods then there is less to produce so less hours for the workers and then they can be at home more.

This is all because we love cheap items and buy them without thinking about who is affected. You can make a difference but not buying cheap products and do a little research into some companies. <u>Amazon and Primark</u> are key examples of places we shop for cheap goods and them treating their workers with little respect.
