#### Go East Careers Week

As part of National Careers Week, Langdon Park took part in East careers Week at the Olympic Park. Here East provides young people of east London with experiences and insights into future careers from world-leading institutions!

Students took part in various events throughout the week; from Industry Insight sessions, employability skills workshops and panel discussion taking place in universities, and creative spaces. Students were able to find out about a range of sectors, meet industry professionals, and develop their skills across the wide range of workshops.



#### Loughborough University Taster Day

Students met local universities including Queen Mary University, UCL, Loughborough University, University of Cumbria London, and London College of Fashion to find out more about a range of subjects and related careers. They took part in workshops from pathways in health care to engineering, fashion and cultural heritage.





#### Good Growth Hub - Design Your Own Social Business Event

The Good Growth Hub and Social Ark teamed up with the Olympic Park, to deliver an exciting social enterprise projects for Langdon Park students to take part in. Both organisations work with the local residents and young people, providing a range of exciting career and business opportunities.

Our Year 10 Business students took part in a workshop with Social Ark to design their own social enterprise. As a way to give back to their community, both teams focused on creating youth led programmes to ensure young people in east london have local job opportunities. The event coordinators were blown away by the competitiveness and passion shown by the students. Well done to both teams involved.









#### The Schools Challenge Programme

As part of The Schools Challenge Programme, Year 9 students have been working in their teams to solve a real world environmental issue. They were set the challenge



to design their own prototype, brand and business plan to solve issues around air quality, urban biodiversity or sustainability in the city.

Two teams from Langdon park were up against 12 other schools in London. Both teams have worked tirelessly during workshops, as well as additional hours of independent research and planning since October 2021.

Team 11's brand was Carbo' and team 12 came up with the brand name 'iGen'. Both worked with professionals from Imperial college and business mentors from J.P. Morgan to create prototypes and present their business plan to two panels of judges in the final.

It is with great pride that we can announce Team 12's

iGen were the overall winners, bringing the trophy back to Langdon Park School for the second year in a row. We are extremely proud of both teams dedication and commitment to the programme. A huge congratulations team iGen.



#### Art Pavilion Exhibition 'Reflect, Reconnect, Renew

Our Year 10 GCSE Art students went to the Art Pavilion in Mile End for an Interior Design Workshop run by students at Central St Martins University.

It was a very successful trip with great inspirational input. The students got to experience quick results with their 3D models being cleverly photographed to produce really convincing results.

The group were able to see work displayed in the Art Pavilion Exhibition which showcases fellow Year 9 and GCSE students work. One project included in our exhibition was inspired by the trend of breadmaking we experienced in lockdown.

Students in year 9 were given the opportunity to relive this on their return to school in some workshops.

This focaccia bread was made with careful placement of the topping ingredients to link to the theme of sunshine and inspired by looking at artists like Van Gogh.

Another project explored Cyanatone printing, a process which uses UV or sunlight to expose a photograph on

chemically treated paper. These Cyanatone photographs and collages were inspired by students sharing stories of loss, reunion, friendships, and experiences of learning from home during COVID 19.

In the spring of 2019 London was forced to live life differently. Locked in and away from friends and family year 9 students came together again to create these artworks, while reflecting on their experiences during the pandemic.

Our 'Reflect - Reconnect - Renew' celebrated the artwork of local art students from 13 Tower Hamlet schools. As part of the exhibition, a series of workshops were held to enable students to explore and experiment with new ideas and processes.

The workshops were delivered by selected artists and our partners, UAL; 'A' Team Arts Education; Bow Arts; Whitechapel Gallery; Chisenhale Gallery, The Princes Trust and London Metropolitan University of Art, Architecture and Design, who also had a presence at the exhibition.




#### Science Week




## Interior Design Workshop Art Pavilion in Mile End

#### Off to the Gallery

Year 12 & 13 Foundation students have embarked on a number of inspiration trips to a number of galleries. Students have visited Tate Modern, Now Gallery, V& A and Serpentine North. The aim of these trips was to inspire our students and to assist them in branding their own designs, to see how designers promote, develop and sell their work.







### Safe East-Compass

Safe East Compass has held a number of workshops with or Year 12 and 13 Foundation students. The workshops enabled students to learn about the different ways in which healthy relationships can foster physical and mental health, support educational and career aspirations and enhance the quality of life. During the various workshops students were provided with age-appropriate information, explored attitudes, values and developed skills in order to empower them to make positive decisions about their health-related behavior.





#### **Motor Mechanics**

Year 12 students have been working in the Motor Mechanics workshop at New City College to develop skills in preparation for the next steps. Whether or not they want to embark on a supported apprenticeship or get a job working in a well-equipped Mechanic workshop, this programme has provided our students first-hand experience of working in this environment.





#### P4C Ambassadors

Year 7 form reps and volunteers take part in level 1 training, building relationships between each other as they work together to develop new leadership skills. P4C ambassadors help to facilitate P4C during tutor time, once a week with the support from tutors. They assist their tutors in facilitating and running P4C enquiries. They continue to develop their confidence, encourage their peers to participate and talk about difficult and controversial topics. Some topics discussed this term:- gender stereotypical behaviour, gender equality, secrets, robots and science, metaverse, and other interesting topics. We now have P4C ambassadors in Year 7-10, and sixth formers have joined in the action too, sharing their experiences, and getting to understand each other by taking a leading role in the school community.



#### Sixth Form

Year 13 had their Pre-Public Exams in February, giving them a final chance for practice prior to the final exams. This also gave them the opportunity to self-reflect and identify areas for development. The next few weeks are crucial as exams started in early May for BTEC students and come with full force from the 23<sup>rd</sup> of May for all others. I cannot reinforce enough the importance of revision over the next few weeks. It is essential that students revise independently outside of the lesson.



Year 12 will have their first Pre-Public Exam (PPE1) from 23 May -10 June. Though there has been classroom based assessments throughout the year, this exam is extremely significant as students will be examined on all content in the first year. They will need to pass all of their A Level/BTEC courses with minimum grades in order to proceed into Year 13. Therefore, it is impera-

tive that students focus on revision and prepare for their PPE1.

We have also been fortunate to have NCS deliver enrichment sessions for Year 12 students. This is a 10 week programme, which will benefit our pupils with their personal development.



Some of our students have been busy raising funds for charitable causes. Well done to Moosa. M 12G who solely raised £229.95 for Comic Relief, through his sponsored silence for the day. This was indeed a challenge for the delightful Moosa! Our Sixth Forms students also worked together to raise money for Ramadan Food Packs in Bangladesh. 
