Why study A-level History?

History is the study of the past. It examines the political, economic, social and cultural issues of different eras and cultures. At its most ambitious, the subject is the study of everything.

A level History is about the acquisition of vital learning skills: you need to be able to read and digest large amounts of information and to identify information relevant to the question you are dealing with. History will teach you how to analyse, reflect and to argue clearly in class and in writing.

You will understand the significance of historical events, the role of individuals in history and the nature of change over time.
